I. INTRODUCTION

Chair Rendon led a moment of silence to recognize the victims, families, and what our community is going through in the wake recent events.

Roll Call:

The Committee reviewed the agenda and acknowledged the 11/3/22 Meeting Notes.

II. PUBLIC FORUM – NON-AGENDA ITEMS

Stacy McCarthy, from Coastside Families Taking Action, a group of about 240 families on the coastside, is looking to make a more sustainable, equitable coastside for all families. It has come to their attention that biking is one of the ways for farmworkers to get around, there is a big push in community to get bikes to farmworkers; many farmworkers live south of town and our trail ends at Cameron's; this means that they have to be on Highway 1; want to see trail extended, bringing this to BPAC in hopes that idea could be advanced.

Bhavana Moini: 1. New eastbound trail that runs from Miramar to Coronado has flooding and is dangerous for bikers when turning right onto Coronado from Highway 1;

2. Safer bike lane needed between Kelly Avenue and Main Street on Highway 1; one similar to the green striped lane that goes along Highway 1 near the Fire Station. Drivers not paying attention; no safe way to continue straight on 1 or get off that exit lane; she submitted a Caltrans request in September of 2022. It would be nice if Caltrans and City could think of the bicycle community and incorporate bicycles in their design, instead of design just for cars.

3. Bumps, possibly due to tree roots, in NB lane between Miarmontes Pt. Road and

Ocean Colony; requiring bikers to go onto the shoulder; it would be nice if they could shave those bumps off.

Pete Cerneka: Interested in hearing the possibility of doing something to improve the biking conditions between Cameron's and Holy Family Child Care; riding children to day care is important, even something simple to remind people not to veer into shoulder would be safer, wanted to share that.

City Engineer responded to citizen comments.

III. AGENDA ITEMS

Administrative Items

- Brandon White was elected Chair and Jane Rae-Dupree was elected Vice-Chair unanimously among all committee members present.
- Return to in-person meetings was discussed.

Management Analyst Matt Nichols provided a PowerPoint presentation about trail signage. Questions, comments, discussion: Speed limits will be included on the signs once we have an ordinance; increase font size; people don't stop to read the signs when enjoying trail; likes the yield sign; need to focus that we are sharing the trail, perhaps announce even on the pavement; people consume pictures rather than text; maybe more graphics than text; many people have long leashes; make rules objective; etiquette signs vs. safety signs; turn off noise canceling/no headphones.

City Engineer Maz Bozorginia provided a PowerPoint presentation and update about the effects of the recent storm, which coincided with the King Tide. Since a state of emergency was declared, we are hoping to recover some of the expenses for time and materials; also seeking support for repairs. City Engineer will reach out to his counterpart at the County to see if the effects of the storm will affect the construction of Mirada Bridge.

IV. DIRECTOR'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

The City did receive some Federal funding for the Eastside Parallel Trail Segment 2, from Spindrift to Frenchman's Creek, through Senator Jackie Speier; we should receive two million from the omnibus bill approved by Congress; this should be everything we need for design and some construction; funding is working its way through the Caltrans appropriation process.

Vigil events were announced.

Next meeting is March 2, 2023, in person at the Emergency Operations Center.
